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wittgenstein s complex and demanding work challenges much that is taken for granted in philosophical thinking as well as in the theorizing of art theology science and culture each essay in this collection explores a key concept involved in wittgenstein s thinking relating it to his understanding of philosophy and outlining the arguments and explaining the implications of each concept concepts covered include grammar meaning and meaning blindness language games and private language family resemblances psychologism rule following teaching and learning avowals moore s paradox aspect seeing the meter stick and criteria students new to wittgenstein and readers interested in developing their understanding of specific aspects of his philosophical work will find this book very welcome

this elegantly translated collection of heidegger s private later writings is illuminating to some of his most difficult discussions phillip braunstein loyola marymount college martin heidegger s the event offers the most in depth articulation of his later work s most foundational concept as well as his most substantial self critique of his contributions to philosophy of the event written between 1936 and 1944 and published posthumously as volume 71 of his complete works the event collects heidegger s private writings in response to his contributions richard rojcewicz s faithful and straightforward translation offers the english speaking reader intimate contact with the author s process of formulating some of his most important concepts this book lays out how the event is to be understood and ties it closely to looking showing self manifestation and the self unveiling of the gods

a book on legal philosophy necessarily focuses attention on law in addition to this focus an introduction to an african legal philosophy focuses attention on philosophy the link between law and philosophy is brought into relief which is done through an african context an attempt is made to spell out what is african about legal philosophy without being cut off of african legal philosophy from non african legal philosophy the book draws attention to the view that a basic component of african legal philosophy consists of an investigation of what it is to be an african and because an african is a human being among other human beings the investigation is about what it is to be a human being ubuntuism is an african derived word that captures this mode of being human moreover because human beings are cultural beings african cultural context guides the investigation inescapably it is claimed that every legal philosophy is embedded in a culture african legal philosophy is not an

exception it is deeply rooted in african culture a culture that is today shaped in part by a european colonialist culture one feature that will strike one as one reads the book is that the book approaches african legal philosophy as a means of decolonization of african culture african legal philosophy can accomplish this intelligently and effectively if it is itself decolonized in doing this it contrasts sharply with mainstream western legal philosophy

of all the topics in the history of philosophy the history of different forms of thinking and contemplation is one of the most important and yet is also relatively overlooked what is it to think philosophically how did different forms of thinking reflection contemplation critique and analysis emerge in different epochs this collection offers a rich and diverse philosophical exploration of the history of contemplation from the classical period to the twenty first century it covers canonical figures including plato aristotle descartes and kant as well as debates in less well known areas such as classical indian and islamic thought and the role of speculation in twentieth century russian philosophy comprising twenty two chapters by an international team of contributors the volume is divided into five parts flourishing and thinking from homer to hume the thinking of thinking from augustine to gödel images and thinking from plotinus to unger bodies of thought and habits of thinking from plato to irigaray the efficacy of thinking from sextus to bataille thought a philosophical history is the first comprehensive investigation of the history of philosophical thought and contemplation as such it is a landmark publication for anyone researching and teaching the history of philosophy and a valuable resource for those studying the subject in related fields such as literature religion sociology and the history of ideas

aristotle versus plato for a long time that is the angle from which the tale has been told in textbooks on the history of philosophy and to university students aristotle s philosophy so the story goes was au fond in opposition to plato s but it was not always thus from the introduction in a wide ranging book likely to cause controversy lloyd p gerson sets out the case for

the harmony of platonism and aristotelianism the standard view in late antiquity he aims to show that the twentieth century view that aristotle started out as a platonist and ended up as an anti platonist is seriously flawed gerson examines the neoplatonic commentators on aristotle based on their principle of harmony in considering ancient studies of aristotle s categories physics de anima metaphysics and nicomachean ethics the author shows how the principle of harmony allows us to understand numerous texts that otherwise appear intractable gerson also explains how these esoteric treatises can be seen not to conflict with the early exoteric and admittedly platonic dialogues of aristotle aristotle and other platonists concludes with an assessment of some of the philosophical results of acknowledging harmony
